Today I rarely see that village comradery, I do see a village that has spread and developed into parts. The tight community I knew has sadly become distant with clearly defined areas, I have even been told that some people have never even walked around the village.

We live in different times and our community has changed, we have double the residents and quadruple the vehicles on the road and this will increase. I firmly believe we would all like to be part of a fun and welcoming village.

To that end I am working with the Parish Council and Reverend Sean Sheffield; to revise the Whitfield Fete on September 21st, details are in the newsletter. Please spread the word and let's see if we can start to get the community back together again. # THE VERNAL EQUINOX

The Vernal Equinox (or official spring time) will occur

at exactly 3.06am on 20th March this year. That means the position of the Earth's axis is neither tilted towards or away from the sun. We can't see the axis or its position but we see the results: equal hours of daylight and darkness.

Now, I don't know about you, but I'm happy when I can say 'Ooh, 6 o'clock and it's still light!' (which, incidentally, will be 8 days before the Vernal Equinox).

It was an ancient Greek gentleman by the name of Hipparchus, who, armed with knowledge from previous ancient Greeks and Babylonians, developed a mathematical theory for predicting the Equinoxes on any given year. As well as creating the first known star catalogue, he's also credited with being the founder of the bane of my life at school: trigonometry. I do find Astronomy fascinating and without trigonometry, we wouldn't have the insight into our solar system, so I'm glad it exists, even if it did cause my brain to melt.

We also put our clocks forward on this night (a useful mnemonic is 'spring forward, fall back') but this has no effect on the Equinox times so why do we do it?

Over 100 years ago (1907 to be exact) a Kentish Builder by the name of William Willett published a pamphlet, titled 'The Waste of Daylight'. His proposal was a little convoluted (he wanted us to advance our clocks by 20 minutes every Sunday in April). But, by getting up an hour earlier when the days were becoming longer, the country would not only be more productive but cut down on its use of vital fuel. In 1916 the Summer Time Act was introduced and since then, we move our clocks forward and backward every year.

With today's flexible working hours, there's an argument for abolishing it but, according to a recent poll, opinion is divided. Some say DST causes up to 2 weeks' lack of sleep, irritability, even car accidents. On the flip side, longer daylight hours promote a more active lifestyle, safer driving conditions and a happier constitution. It's a balance, I suppose, and no more so than on 20 March. # **DOVER SMART PROJECT**



One of the features in Whitfield often forgotten but used daily by hundreds of residents is our underpass.

Over the years it has seen several facelifts in terms of wall graffiti, some I know have been less popular some quite inspired.

Well, I am delighted to tell you that Dover Smart Project have arranged another redesign and facelift. The timetable for the underpass works is as follows:

Starting 4th March KCC highways will be weeding the area. They will also scrub the underpass making it as clean as possible.

The next phase is preparing the wall surfaces that will be 7/8th March, the current graffiti needs to be removed, or painted over ready for the new designs.

We are expecting the Graffiti artists to begin the transformation Monday I I th and on Wednesday I 3th Community paint day (all community members will be invited to send representation and participate). The whole process is expected to be finished by Thursday 14th.

There will be a community opening or unveiling and the organisers will provide more details when confirmed. Look out for more details on the website or via posters.

Mya Lawrence will be remembered within in this project; the organisers have spoken to Mya's mum who is happy to be involved.

The Parish Council continue to hold meetings on the second Tuesday of the Month and consider ways to maintain and improve the amenity of the Parish.

#### January Meeting summary:

Council agreed the Precept demand on DDC of  $\pounds120,000.00$  for the 2024/2025 financial year. ( $\pounds50.71$  for a band D property).

Village PC Ian Belsey will be moving to a new role and PC Cheryl Ellis will be taking over as the named PC for Whitfield.

DDC Cllr Roger Knight reported that he has successfully lobbied Officers at Dover District Council for additional emptying of the Dog Waste Bin at the Archers Court Road crossing, and that he has met with the Whitfield Brownie Leader to discuss the plans for a new Brownie Hut. Some concerns will be taken forward to DDC.

Council discussed Planning Applications and comments submitted. A new page to summarise Development Applications has been added to the Website for concerned Residents.

Consideration of the adoption of some of the 'green spaces' created in the new developments will be taken forward to future meetings.

KCC Highways have been instructed to go ahead with the proposed 30mph roundels and reminders on Archer's Court Road. There are now three projects resulting from the Highways Improvement Plan that are in various stages of progress.

A quotation of  $\pounds 6424.28$  was agreed for the annual Grounds Maintenance contract.

The damaged Spring Horse has been removed from the Small Play Area and the surface area made safe. A 'Betty Bee Spring Rocker shall be installed, at a cost of  $\pounds1,995.00$ .

A report from the Fete Group meeting included good initial ideas brought to the table. It was agreed that as plans progress Council will look at ways in which we can support the event.

#### February meeting summary:

Council agreed to investigate viability and payback of Solar Panels on the Pavilion roof to reduce gas and electric bills.

A Parish Council response to the KCC Bus Gate Enforcement Consultation in respect of the Bus Gates for Dover Fasttrack Scheme will be made, supporting their use and effective enforcement measures.

Council agreed to place a regular full column article reporting on Council activities in the Whitfield Village News at a cost of  $\pounds$ 125 to support its publication.

Whitfield Underpass Project. Council agreed to grant up to £1936 to the SmART project to cover remaining costs of renovation and painting a Mural. This will improve the safety and environment for users Schools and community groups will be involved and help to carry out the work.

Council agreed to grant £288 to the Litter Picking Group for equipment.

Council agreed to grant £1000 to the Pegasus to support their 2024 Summer Scheme.

#### **Damage to Football Pitches**

Whitfield Juniors Football reported pitches are being damaged by dogs digging holes and motorcycles churning the area. For the Safety of the children playing, this could result in matches having to be called off.

These activities on the Recreation ground are specifically prohibited by the By-Laws, Any persons identified will be reported to the Police for damage to property and may be fined up to level 2 on the standard scale.

One thing I try to avoid is the political side of things, I stood for Whitfield, not for central Government, so judge me on that and I won't let you down.

So, in my 10 months, I have worked with the Parish Council, I have helped several residents, and now I am representing the Brownies.

You probably don't know but the land on which the Brownie Hut stands, and has stood for many years, is being sold to the Care Home next door. This has been a long running issue, which I am not happy about, but as a new Councillor I have come into office too late to stop the sale.

I am extremely disappointed in the DDC for allowing this to happen. What I can and will do is represent the Brownies and try to ensure they are treated fairly. There are plans to build a new hut, which is great, but in a position, in my opinion, that does not leave enough room for the outside activities they require. There is a compromise to be had, let's hope all involved will agree.

## THE JOY OF GIVING UP

"So what are you giving up for Lent then?"

I wonder if you have been asked that question in these past couple of weeks? Church goer or not. Follower of Jesus or not.

This time of Lent we find ourselves in now, as we journey towards Easter, seems to have become an alternative, or indeed for some, a new, New Years' time of resolution. This 6-week period between the pancakes of Shrove Tuesday and the Easter eggs sitting ready for the celebrations of Easter Day;

when many of us attempt valiantly to give up chocolate, booze, swearing, smoking, Facebook, Netflix or some other indulgence in an attempt to observe the 'fasting' of a Holy Lent.

Of course many of us observe this time as a response to Jesus' 40 days spent in the wilderness, a time when he fasted, was tempted and was being prepared for his ministry. And so Lent, is a time of self-examination, reflection, and a time for us to be aware of the possibilities of new life in Jesus Christ. Many of us 'fast' from the things we crave and enjoy, to help us focus on God as we prepare ourselves spiritually for the coming of Easter Day as we celebrate the risen Jesus Christ, and shout with joy, "Alleluia, Christ is Risen!"

But fasting is not so common as it was in Jesus's day, when it was part of the rhythm of a faithful life, and dare I say it, religious life. And although our giving up of something can feel significant to us, the reality is that in our culture of abundance and over-indulgence, I wonder what this giving up really signifies today. The craving, boredom, or restlessness we feel when we are fasting is meant to point to and symbolize a hunger only God can fill.

But let's face it, we don't like giving things up do we?

In fact our giving up can lead to us being irritable, miserable, and downright grumpy with those around us, as we feel we are being cheated and losing out on the only things that bring us joy. Or we make a point of telling anyone that will listen (as often as we can) just what we are sacrificing for the sake of observing a Holy 'fasting' Lent.Almost becoming a martyr to our 'giving up'.

But I wonder if there is another way. A way of recovering and rediscovering joy during Lent, and still reflecting on that wilderness journey of Jesus in those 40 days in which he was alone and tempted.

Perhaps we need to recall part of the message he gave to his disciples that flocked to hear him talk on that hillside in northern Israel. When he said (amongst other things), "and when you fast, do not look gloomy", "but when you fast comb your hair and wash your face."

In other words, let your sacrifice this Lent be one of joy. Let your giving up point you towards God, who satisfies all our needs. Smile, laugh, rejoice, and think not of the things you think you are missing out on, but the abundance that you have. The relationships that fulfil and sustain and surround you in family and friends.

Of what you have, rather than what you feel you do not have.

Joy is infectious and tends to spread to those around us.

Joy adapts and changes as it is shared, and enables us to endure the most difficult of times.

Joy has the ability to change things.

Joy is not as difficult as it sounds, it just sometimes takes our intention and commitment.

So yes, why not observe a Holy fasting Lent, abstain from those things that we know perhaps are not that good for us anyway. But do so with joy, and rejoice this Lent in your giving up. 'Wash your face', smile and rejoice with those around you.

# WHITFIELD GARDENER'S SOCIETY

Whitfield Gardener's Society has been running for

about 70 years in various forms. At the moment, it has about 80 members, but the society would love to see more Whitfield villagers in its ranks especially the young and those keen on gardening.

The society has a committee, and this is led by Richard Bates and his deputy Mick Burkimsher.

It is  $\pounds 15$  per year to be a Whitfield Gardener's Society member. This entitles members to attend the talks/meetings for free, have a programme of events and show details, and to enter the shows.

Whitfield Gardener's Society talks/meetings are held in Whitfield Village Hall (CT16 3LY) on the second Monday of most months (see programme).

The hall opens at 7pm. The whole meeting runs from 7.30 to about 9.30pm with the talk usually lasting for about an hour then there are refreshments at 50p for a cup of tea/coffee and a biscuit, then the raffle is held. After which we all go home.

Members of the public can attend each talk for a fee of  $\pounds$ 3 per person. The meeting on 11th March is about pruning and then the meeting

on 8th April which is about allotments followed by "the Poison Garden" on 13th May.

The Society has a sales table at each meeting selling a few plants and bits and pieces donated by members which are available to buy for a small cost. These help to generate funds along with the raffle.

Whitfield Gardener's Society holds 3 shows a year one in Spring; one in Summer and one in the Autumn in Whitfield Village Hall. The dates of these are:

To enter a show a person needs to be a paid-up member. However, after the judging the shows are open to the public from 2.30 to 4pm so people can see what people have grown, cooked, or crafted. There are refreshments at the shows too.
